SELECTING THE VOTES

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the "gold standard" and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America's federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.





MISSOURI SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

SJR 3 Capping the State Income Tax.

This resolution attempts to cap the state income tax at 5.5%. CPAC supports measures that prevent wanton increases in the tax burden and supported this resolution as a small step in the right direction. The Senate passed this resolution on February 9, 2023 by a vote of 29-3.

SB 4 Strengthening Parental Rights in Education in Missouri.

This bill requires that parents be able to review the materials used in their child's school's curricula in a timely manner. CPAC supports efforts to increase parental rights in education and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 13, 2023 by a vote of 21-12 but the bill did not receive final approval.

SB 39 Protecting Women's Sports in Missouri.

This bill prohibits males from participating in athletics competitions made for women. CPAC supports the creation of a safe and fair environment of play in school sports and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 23, 2023 by a vote of 25-8 and the bill later became law.

SB 49 No Radical Gender Surgeries for Minors in Missouri.

This bill prohibits physicians from performing "gender reassignment" surgeries on minors or prescribing hormone replacement therapy to minors. CPAC opposes the castration and mutilation of minors and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 23, 2023 by a vote of 24-8 and the bill later became law.

SB 94 Enriching Nearly Everyone in the Entertainment Industry.

This bill remodels the motion picture tax credit program such that film producers can receive up to 50% of the qualifying expenditures that they accrue back in incentives for producing movies in Missouri. The bill also expands the list of industries that can receive incentives under this program. For example, producers of virtual reality content and video games may now qualify for these incentives. CPAC opposes the subsidization of the entertainment industry and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 27, 2023 by a vote of 20-12 and the bill later became law.

SB 106 Forgivable Loans for Health Professionals.

This bill establishes a program that apportions forgivable loans to healthcare professionals. It also expands several other grant and loan repayment programs relating to healthcare professionals. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to pay for other people's education and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 5, 2023 by a vote of 26-7 and the bill later became law.





MISSOURI SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

SB 115 Fighting Municipal Overreach in Veterinarian Regulations.

This bill reserves the power to regulate veterinarians to the state legislature. CPAC supports efforts to reduce the government's micromanagement of select professions and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 30, 2023 by a vote of 22-11 but the bill did not progress in the House.

SB 138 Expanding Subsidies to Biodiesel and Ethanol Retailers.

This bill increases the cap on the maximum amount of credits that may be awarded to biodiesel retailers from four to five million dollars under one of Missouri's biodiesel incentive programs. CPAC supports all forms of energy, does not believe that the government should support one form of energy over another, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 10, 2023 by a vote of 28-6 and the bill later became law.

SB 222 Protecting Property Owners from Municipal Overreach.

This bill prohibits localities from imposing moratoriums on eviction proceedings unless specifically authorized to do so by the state. CPAC opposes such actions by local governments, the likes of which tread on people's property rights, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 30, 2023 by a vote of 25-8 but the bill did not progress any further.

SB 542 Fighting Off COVID-19 Vaccine Requirements.

This bill prevents the governor from requiring that National Guard members receive a vaccine. CPAC opposes vaccine mandates, believes that the decision to get a vaccine should be made as voluntary as possible, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 17, 2023 by a vote of 24-9 but the bill did not progress in the House.

HB 2 (Amd. 2) No Funding for DEI Initiatives in Universities.

This amendment prohibits administrators at public universities from using money appropriated to the state's educational endeavors to fund DEI initiatives. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to help pay for DEI initiatives, opposes DEI in public schools, and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated this amendment on April 25, 2023 by a vote of 14-18.

MISSOURI HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

SB 39 Protecting Women's Sports in Missouri.

This bill prohibits males from participating in athletics competitions made for women. CPAC supports the creation of a safe and fair environment of play in school sports and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 10, 2023 by a vote of 110-49 and the bill later became law.

SB 49 No Radical Gender Surgeries for Minors in Missouri.

This bill prohibits physicians from performing "gender reassignment" surgeries on minors or prescribing hormone replacement therapy to minors. CPAC opposes the castration and mutilation of minors and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 10, 2023 by a vote of 108-50 and the bill later became law.

SB 94 Enriching Nearly Everyone in the Entertainment Industry.

This bill remodels the motion picture tax credit program such that film producers can receive up to 50% of the qualifying expenditures that they accrue back in incentives for producing movies in Missouri. The bill also expands the list of industries that can receive incentives under this program. For example, producers of virtual reality content and video games may now qualify for these incentives. CPAC opposes the subsidization of the entertainment industry and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 4, 2023 by a vote of 113-45 and the bill later became law.

HR 12 Opposing Intrusive Leftist Climate Change Regulations.

This resolution urges Missouri to oppose ESG-backed policies and regulations handed down by the federal government. CPAC supports efforts to oppose the spread of Leftist doctrines on climate change and supported this resolution. The House passed this resolution on May 12, 2023 by a vote of 106-36.

HJR 66 Prohibiting Ranked-Choice Voting in Missouri.

This resolution prohibits elections officials from conducting elections through a process of ranked-choice voting. Ranked-choice voting is a system of voting wherein, in some circumstances, the individual who places second in the election can win the election by having votes from other losing candidates assigned to them. CPAC opposes this consequence and supported this resolution. The House passed this resolution on May 5, 2023 by a vote of 102-44.





MISSOURI HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

HB 136 Protecting First Amendment Freedoms at Missouri's Universities.

This bill prohibits public universities from taking adverse actions against belief-based student organizations because of their beliefs or because of requirements in place within the organization stating that its leader must be an adherent to their beliefs. CPAC supports efforts to protect First Amendment freedoms on college campuses and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on April 11, 2023 by a vote of 108-42 but the bill did not progress in the Senate.

SB 106 Forgivable Loans for Health Professionals.

This bill establishes a program that apportions forgivable loans to healthcare professionals. It also expands several other grant and loan repayment programs relating to healthcare professionals. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to pay for other people's education and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 2, 2023 by a vote of 118-29 and the bill later became law.

SB 138 Expanding Subsidies to Biodiesel and Ethanol Retailers.

This bill increases the cap on the maximum amount of credits that may be awarded to biodiesel retailers from four to five million dollars under one of Missouri's biodiesel incentive programs. CPAC supports all forms of energy, does not believe that the government should support one form of energy over another, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 10, 2023 by a vote of 136-19 and the bill later became law.

HB 253 Light Promotion of School Choice.

This bill sets up a program that makes it slightly easier for children to attend schools to which they have not been pre-assigned. CPAC supports school choice and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 8, 2023 by a vote of 85-69 but the bill did not receive final approval.

HB 282 Various Measures to Improve Missourians' Second Amendment Freedoms.

This bill lowers the age at which an individual may be issued a concealed carry permit by one year. It also removes a prohibition that prevented permitholders from carrying a concealed firearm into a place of worship. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on April 17, 2023 by a vote of 105-41 but the bill stalled in the Senate.





MISSOURI HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

HB 668 Paying For Other People's Cybersecurity Needs.

This bill authorizes the Department of Economic Development to distribute one-time grants to qualifying employers such that they may enhance their cybersecurity. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to pay for the cybersecurity needs of private firms and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on March 20, 2023 by a vote of 111-40 but the bill did not progress in the Senate.

HB 730 Protecting Property Owners from Municipal Overreach.

This bill prohibits localities from imposing moratoriums on eviction proceedings unless specifically authorized to do so by the state. CPAC supports efforts to protect the rights of property owners and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 2, 2023 by a vote of 104-42 but the bill did not progress any further.

HB 777 Loosening Certificate of Need Requirements.

This bill makes it somewhat easier for healthcare facilities to navigate certificate of need requirements. CPAC supports certificate of need reform and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed this bill on April 24, 2023 by a vote of 103-43 but the bill did not progress in the Senate.

HB 863 Eradicating the Influence of ESG Within the Government.

This bill prohibits state agencies from adopting regulations or promulgating guidelines that hamstring particular industries or companies for the sake of pursuing ESG objectives. It also prohibits fiduciaries of the state from investing funds on the basis of ESG standards. CPAC supports the removal of ESG from the government's halls of power and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 27, 2023 by a vote of 105-43 but the bill did not progress any further.

HB 903 Less Missourian Agricultural Land for Foreign Adversaries.

This bill reduces the amount of agricultural land that foreign agents may possess a controlling interest in. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 28, 2023 by a vote of 107-42 but the bill did not progress any further.
